The Making of a Minister

My middle name, Donald, has always carried more weight than most people might imagine. I was named after my grandfather, Don Mangus—a church planter and pastor whose sermons shaped not just congregations, but the fabric of our family. From the earliest days of my life, people said I'd be a preacher one day. Grandpa said it, my parents said it, even people at church said it. And maybe they saw something I couldn't yet.

While most kids my age were playing "school" or "house," I played "church." I'd pull on one of my dad's ties, stand behind a cardboard box I called a pulpit, and preach to an invisible congregation. In my imagination, they were rapt with attention, hanging on every word. I'm sure I made up most of the sermons—but the seed was planted early.

When I was thirteen, that seed sprouted at a Christian camp in South Carolina called The Wilds. It was the highlight of every summer—over a thousand kids, wild games, swimming, hiking, and plenty of good-hearted flirting with girls from all over the country. Every year I came home with new pen pals, one of whom, a girl named Jen, wrote to me for nearly four years. I wish I could remember her last name.

But beyond the games and laughter, what drew me most to The Wilds was the preaching. We always tried to go the week that Dr. Tom Farrell was speaking. He was funny, intense, and had that unmistakable sense that God was working through him. That summer, he preached a series on Elijah and Elisha, and one message—"The Man God Uses"—cut straight through me. He challenged us to surrender our lives to full-time ministry, and I knew right then what I had to do. I made the commitment.

The next Sunday at our home church, Landmark, we were asked to share about our camp experiences. When I stood up and told the congregation that I was surrendering to full-time ministry, Grandpa's eyes filled with tears. He hugged me afterward and said, "I'm proud of you, Brent." Those words sank deep.

That was the first step—but certainly not the last.

The following spring, Grandpa passed away. And not long after, I encountered a struggle that would haunt me for years—a sexual addiction that began innocently enough but quickly became a secret battle. When I returned to camp the next summer, Dr. Farrell preached about Samson and how his compromise destroyed his calling. His words hit hard. I confessed my sin, determined to change. But the struggle continued, on and off, for the next fourteen years.

Still, God's hand never left me. When I was fourteen, I preached my first sermon—a five-minute message on Psalm 136. I must've repeated "for His mercy endureth forever" a dozen times. People told me years later that they still remembered that sermon. It was short, simple, and pure-hearted. I started preaching monthly at a nursing home after that.

Then came another pivotal voice: a visiting youth pastor, Brother Kurt Copeland. During a school chapel service, he challenged us to make a difference in our generation—to live for the Lord without compromise. Once again, I re-committed myself to the call.

After high school, I enrolled at Pensacola Christian College and majored in Pastoral Ministries. Four years later, diploma in hand, I moved to Maine to become a youth pastor. For nine years, I served students and families there. Those were some of the best and hardest years of my life. When my marriage fell apart and my wife filed for divorce, I resigned, broken and convinced that my time in ministry was over.

Then came Basic Training.

At first, I thought it was just a new chapter in life, but God had something else in mind. During training, the chaplain gave me the responsibility of leading the first half of the Protestant chapel service each week. No constraints. No script. I led everything up to the sermon—and even the invitation afterward. I had never been given that kind of freedom before, and through it, God began to breathe life back into my calling. Soldiers started coming to me for prayer and counsel. It was as if God whispered, "You're not done yet."

That's when I knew—I was called to be a chaplain.

About a year later, I began seminary in Pennsylvania, pursuing my Master of Divinity. Four years of hard study, working, serving, and healing. Even then, I didn't feel called to be a pastor. I thought I'd serve as a chaplain or perhaps join the staff of a larger church as a pastoral care director. But when every door in that direction closed, I heard about a small country church in the next town overlooking for a pastor.

That church was Salem.

I prayed, applied, interviewed—and five months later, I stood behind a real pulpit once again, as the pastor of Salem Church.

Today, I can honestly say I love everything about being a pastor—the visits, the counseling, the weddings, even the funerals. But what I love most is preaching the Word of God. There's something holy about standing before a congregation—or a room full of Soldiers—and proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

All along, God had been preparing me for this. From the cardboard box pulpit in my childhood bedroom to the small sanctuary of a country church, it's been one long, winding road of grace.

And through it all, one truth remains the same—His mercy endureth forever.
